## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 552.147, Government Code, is amended to
- 7 read as follows:
- 8 Sec. 552.147. [EXCEPTION:] SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS [NUMBER
- 9 OF LIVING PERSON]. (a) The social security number of a living
- 10 person is excepted from the requirements of Section 552.021, but is
- 11 not confidential under this chapter.
- 12 (b) A governmental body may redact the social security
- 13 number of a living person from any information the governmental
- 14 body discloses under Section 552.021 without the necessity of
- 15 requesting a decision from the attorney general under Subchapter G.
- (c) Notwithstanding any other law, a county or district
- 17 clerk may disclose in the ordinary course of business a social
- 18 security number that is contained in information held by the
- 19 clerk's office, and that disclosure is not official misconduct and
- 20 does not subject the clerk to civil or criminal liability of any
- 21 kind under the law of this state, including any claim for damages in
- 22 a lawsuit or the criminal penalty imposed by Section 552.352.
- 23 (d) A county or district clerk shall establish a procedure
- 24 under which a social security number of a living person that is

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- contained in information held by the clerk, including information
  available on an Internet website maintained by or under the control
  of the clerk, shall be redacted within a reasonable time by the
  clerk on receipt of a written request from the living person or that
  person's authorized representative that identifies the specific
  document or documents from which the social security number shall
  be redacted.
- SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect on the 91st day after the last day of the legislative session.
