4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 341.039, Health and Safety Code, is
6	amended to read as follows:
7	Sec. 341.039. [ <del>GRAYWATER</del> ] STANDARDS <u>FOR GRAYWATER AND</u>
8	ALTERNATIVE ONSITE WATER. (a) The commission by rule shall adopt
9	and implement minimum standards for the indoor and outdoor use and
10	reuse of <u>treated</u> graywater <u>and alternative onsite water</u> for:
11	(1) irrigation and other agricultural purposes;
12	(2) domestic use, to the extent consistent with
13	Subsection (c);
14	(3) commercial purposes; and
15	(4) industrial purposes.
16	(a-1) The standards adopted by the commission under
17	Subsection (a)(2) must allow the use of graywater and alternative
18	onsite water for toilet and urinal flushing.
19	(b) The standards adopted by the commission under
20	Subsection (a) must assure that the use of graywater or alternative
21	onsite water is not a nuisance and does not threaten human health or
22	damage the quality of surface water and groundwater in this state.
23	(b-1) The commission by rule may adopt and implement rules
24	providing for the inspection and annual testing of a graywater or

1 alternative onsite water system by the commission. (b-2) The commission shall develop and make available to the 2 public a regulatory guidance manual to explain the rules adopted 3 4 under this section. 5 (c) The commission may not require a permit for the domestic use of less than 400 gallons of graywater or alternative onsite 6 water each day if the water [graywater]: 7 8 (1) originates from a private residence; 9 (2) is used by the occupants of that residence for gardening, composting, [or] landscaping, or indoor use as allowed 10 by rule, including toilet or urinal flushing, at the residence; 11 12 (3) is collected using a system that may be diverted [overflows] into a sewage collection or on-site wastewater 13 treatment and disposal system; 14 15 (4) is, if required by rule, stored in surge tanks that: 16 17 (A) are clearly labeled as nonpotable water; restrict access, especially to children; and 18 (B) 19 (C) eliminate habitat for mosquitoes and other 20 vectors; (5) uses piping clearly identified as a nonpotable 21 water conduit, including identification through the use of purple 22 pipe, purple tape, or similar markings; 23 24 (6) is generated without the formation of ponds or pools of graywater or alternative onsite water; 25 26 (7) does not create runoff across the property lines or onto any paved surface; and 27

No. 1902 1 (8) is distributed by a surface or subsurface system 2 that does not spray into the air. 3 (d) Each builder is encouraged to: 4 install plumbing in new housing in a manner that (1)5 provides the capacity to collect graywater or alternative onsite water from all allowable sources; and 6 (2) design and install a subsurface graywater or 7 8 alternative onsite water system around the foundation of new housing in a way that minimizes foundation movement or cracking. 9 10 (e) In this section<u>:</u> (1) "Alternative onsite water" means rainwater, 11 12 air-conditioner condensate, foundation drain water, storm water, cooling tower blowdown, swimming pool backwash and drain water, 13 reverse osmosis reject water, or any other source of water 14 15 considered appropriate by the commission. (2) "Graywater" [, "graywater"] means wastewater from 16 17 clothes-washing machines, showers, bathtubs, hand-washing lavatories, and sinks that are not used for disposal of hazardous or 18 toxic ingredients. The term does not include wastewater: 19 20 (A) [(1)] that has come in contact with toilet 21 waste; 22 <u>(B)</u> [<del>(2)</del>] from the washing of material, including diapers, soiled with human excreta; or 23 24 (C) [(3)] from sinks used for food preparation or 25 disposal. SECTION 2. Section 366.012(a), Health and Safety Code, is 26 27 amended to read as follows:

H.B. No. 1902 To assure the effective and efficient administration of 1 (a) 2 this chapter, the commission shall: 3 (1)adopt rules governing the installation of on-site sewage disposal systems, including rules concerning the: 4 5 (A) review and of approval on-site sewage disposal systems; and 6 7 temporary waiver of a permit for an emergency (B) 8 repair; and 9 (2) adopt rules under this chapter that: 10 (A) encourage the use of economically feasible alternative techniques and technologies for on-site sewage 11 disposal systems that can be used in soils not suitable for 12 conventional on-site sewage disposal; 13 14 (B) address the separation of graywater, as 15 defined by Section 341.039, in a residence served by an on-site sewage disposal system; [and] 16 17 (C) allow for an adjustment in the size required of an on-site sewage disposal system if the system is used in 18 conjunction with a graywater system that complies with the rules 19 adopted under Section 341.039; and 20 21 require on-site sewage disposal systems, (D) including risers and covers, installed after September 1, 2012, to 22 23 be designed to prevent access to the system by anyone other than: 24 (i) the owner of the system; or 25 (ii) a described person by Section 26 366.071(a) or (b). SECTION 3. Section 26.0311, Water Code, is amended by 27

1 amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (b-1) to read as
2 follows:

(a) In this section, "graywater" <u>has the meaning provided by</u>
<u>Section 341.039</u>, <u>Health and Safety Code</u> [means wastewater from
<del>clothes</del> washing machines, showers, bathtubs, handwashing
<del>lavatories</del>, and sinks that are not used for disposal of hazardous or
toxic ingredients. The term does not include wastewater:

[<del>(1) that has come in contact with toilet waste;</del>

9 [(2) from the washing of material, including diapers, 10 soiled with human excreta; or

11 [(3) from sinks used for food preparation or 12 disposal].

13 (b-1) The standards adopted by the commission under 14 Subsection (b)(2) must allow the use of graywater for toilet and 15 urinal flushing.

16 SECTION 4. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality 17 shall adopt the standards required by Sections 341.039 and 366.012, 18 Health and Safety Code, as amended by this Act, and Section 26.0311, 19 Water Code, as amended by this Act, not later than January 1, 2017.

20 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 21 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 22 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 23 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 24 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
