

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the composition, duties, and continuation of the human
3 trafficking prevention task force.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Sections 402.035(c), (d), and (h), Government
6 Code, are amended to read as follows:

7 (c) The task force is composed of the following:

8 (1) the governor or the governor's designee;

9 (2) the attorney general or the attorney general's
10 designee;

11 (3) the executive commissioner of the Health and Human
12 Services Commission or the executive commissioner's designee;

13 (4) the commissioner of the Department of Family and
14 Protective Services or the commissioner's designee;

15 (5) the commissioner of the Department of State Health
16 Services or the commissioner's designee;

17 (6) the public safety director of the Department of
18 Public Safety or the director's designee;

19 (7) one representative from each of the following
20 state agencies, appointed by the chief administrative officer of
21 the respective agency:

22 (A) the Texas Workforce Commission;

23 (B) the Texas Department of Criminal Justice;

24 (C) the Texas Juvenile Justice Department [~~Youth~~

1 ~~Commission;~~

2 [~~(D) the Texas Juvenile Probation Commission];~~

3 and

4 (D) [~~(E)~~] the Texas Alcoholic Beverage
5 Commission; and

6 (8) as appointed by the attorney general:

7 (A) a chief public defender employed by a public
8 defender's office, as defined by Article 26.044(a), Code of
9 Criminal Procedure, or an attorney designated by the chief public
10 defender;

11 (B) an attorney representing the state;

12 (C) a representative of:

13 (i) a hotel and motel association;

14 (ii) a district and county attorneys
15 association; ~~and~~

16 (iii) a state police association; and

17 (iv) a statewide medical association;

18 (D) representatives of sheriff's departments;

19 (E) representatives of local law enforcement
20 agencies affected by human trafficking; and

21 (F) representatives of nongovernmental entities
22 making comprehensive efforts to combat human trafficking by:

23 (i) identifying human trafficking victims;

24 (ii) providing legal or other services to
25 human trafficking victims;

26 (iii) participating in community outreach
27 or public awareness efforts regarding human trafficking;

1 (iv) providing or developing training
2 regarding the prevention of human trafficking; or

3 (v) engaging in other activities designed
4 to prevent human trafficking.

5 (d) The task force shall:

6 (1) collaborate, as needed to fulfill the duties of
7 the task force, with:

8 (A) United States attorneys for the districts of
9 Texas; and

10 (B) special agents or customs and border
11 protection officers and border patrol agents of:

12 (i) the Federal Bureau of Investigation;

13 (ii) the United States Drug Enforcement
14 Administration;

15 (iii) the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco,
16 Firearms and Explosives;

17 (iv) United States Immigration and Customs
18 Enforcement; or

19 (v) the United States Department of
20 Homeland Security;

21 (2) collect, organize, and periodically publish
22 statistical data on the nature and extent of human trafficking in
23 this state, including data described by Subdivisions (4)(A), (B),
24 (C), (D), and (E);

25 (3) solicit cooperation and assistance from state and
26 local governmental agencies, political subdivisions of the state,
27 nongovernmental organizations, and other persons, as appropriate,

1 for the purpose of collecting and organizing statistical data under
2 Subdivision (2);

3 (4) ensure that each state or local governmental
4 agency and political subdivision of the state and each state or
5 local law enforcement agency, district attorney, or county attorney
6 that assists in the prevention of human trafficking collects
7 statistical data related to human trafficking, including, as
8 appropriate:

9 (A) the number of investigations concerning,
10 arrests and prosecutions for, and convictions of:

11 (i) the offense of trafficking of persons;
12 [~~and~~]

13 (ii) the offense of forgery or an offense
14 under Chapter 43, Penal Code, if the offense was committed as part
15 of a criminal episode involving the trafficking of persons; and

16 (iii) an offense punishable under Section
17 43.02(c)(3), Penal Code, regardless of whether the offense was
18 committed as part of a criminal episode involving the trafficking
19 of persons;

20 (B) demographic information on persons who are
21 convicted of offenses described by Paragraph (A) and persons who
22 are the victims of those offenses;

23 (C) geographic routes by which human trafficking
24 victims are trafficked, including routes by which victims are
25 trafficked across this state's international border, and
26 geographic patterns in human trafficking, including the country or
27 state of origin and the country or state of destination;

1 (D) means of transportation and methods used by
2 persons who engage in trafficking to transport their victims; and

3 (E) social and economic factors that create a
4 demand for the labor or services that victims of human trafficking
5 are forced to provide;

6 (5) work with the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement
7 [~~Officer Standards and Education~~] to develop and conduct training
8 for law enforcement personnel, victim service providers, and
9 medical service providers to identify victims of human trafficking;

10 (6) work with the Texas Education Agency, the
11 Department of Family and Protective Services, and the Health and
12 Human Services Commission to:

13 (A) develop a list of key indicators that a
14 person is a victim of human trafficking;

15 (B) develop a standardized curriculum for
16 training doctors, nurses, emergency medical services personnel,
17 teachers, school counselors, school administrators, and personnel
18 from the Department of Family and Protective Services and the
19 Health and Human Services Commission to identify and assist victims
20 of human trafficking;

21 (C) train doctors, nurses, emergency medical
22 services personnel, teachers, school counselors, school
23 administrators, and personnel from the Department of Family and
24 Protective Services and the Health and Human Services Commission to
25 identify and assist victims of human trafficking;

26 (D) develop and conduct training for personnel
27 from the Department of Family and Protective Services and the

1 Health and Human Services Commission on methods for identifying
2 children in foster care who may be at risk of becoming victims of
3 human trafficking; and

4 (E) develop a process for referring identified
5 human trafficking victims and individuals at risk of becoming
6 victims to appropriate entities for services;

7 (7) on the request of a judge of a county court, county
8 court at law, or district court or a county attorney, district
9 attorney, or criminal district attorney, assist and train the judge
10 or the judge's staff or the attorney or the attorney's staff in the
11 recognition and prevention of human trafficking;

12 (8) examine training protocols related to human
13 trafficking issues, as developed and implemented by federal, state,
14 and local law enforcement agencies;

15 (9) collaborate with state and local governmental
16 agencies, political subdivisions of the state, and nongovernmental
17 organizations to implement a media awareness campaign in
18 communities affected by human trafficking;

19 (10) develop recommendations on how to strengthen
20 state and local efforts to prevent human trafficking, protect and
21 assist human trafficking victims, and prosecute human trafficking
22 offenders; ~~and~~

23 (11) examine the extent to which human trafficking is
24 associated with the operation of sexually oriented businesses, as
25 defined by Section [243.002](#), Local Government Code, and the
26 workplace or public health concerns that are created by the
27 association of human trafficking and the operation of sexually

1 oriented businesses; and

2 (12) develop recommendations for addressing the
3 demand for forced labor or services or sexual conduct involving
4 victims of human trafficking, including recommendations for
5 increased penalties for individuals who engage or attempt to engage
6 in prostitution with victims younger than 18 years of age.

7 (h) This section expires September 1, 2017 [~~2015~~].

8 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
9 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
10 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
11 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
12 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
