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	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
1	AN ACT
2	relating to human sexuality education in public schools.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 28, Education Code, is
5	amended by adding Section 28.0042 to read as follows:
6	Sec. 28.0042. HUMAN SEXUALITY EDUCATION. (a) In this
7	section:
8	(1) "Age-appropriate" means suitable to particular
9	ages or age groups of children or adolescents, based on developing
10	cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity typical for the age
11	or age group.
12	(2) "Medically accurate" means supported by
13	peer-reviewed research conducted in compliance with accepted
14	scientific methods and recognized as accurate by leading
15	professional organizations and agencies with relevant experience,
16	such as the American Medical Association.
17	(b) A school district shall provide human sexuality
18	education in accordance with this section at grade levels specified
19	by the State Board of Education.
20	(c) The State Board of Education by rule shall adopt the
21	essential knowledge and skills for medically accurate,
22	age-appropriate curricula to be used by a school district in
23	providing human sexuality education under this section. As
24	age-appropriate, the curricula must:

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1	(1) be inclusive of same-sex couples when discussing
2	or providing examples of relationships, and include affirming
3	information regarding gender identity, gender expression, and
4	sexual orientation;
5	(2) cover human sexuality, pregnancy, and sexually
6	transmitted infections, including:
7	(A) human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and
8	acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS);
9	(B) methods of transmission, including
10	intravenous drug use;
11	(C) strategies to reduce the risk of HIV
12	infection;
13	(D) social and public health issues related to
14	HIV and AIDS; and
15	(E) treatment of HIV and other sexually
16	transmitted infections;
17	(3) discuss human sexuality as a normal and healthy
18	aspect of human development;
19	(4) discuss local resources for sexual and
20	reproductive health care, including how to access those resources;
21	(5) emphasize that abstinence from sexual activity, if
22	used consistently and correctly, is the only method that is 100
23	percent effective in preventing pregnancy and sexually transmitted
24	infections;
25	(6) provide information about the effectiveness, side
26	effects, and proper use of the methods approved by the United States
27	Food and Drug Administration for preventing unintended pregnancy

and reducing the risk of contracting sexually transmitted 1 2 infections; 3 (7) promote relationship, communication, and decision-making skills, including strategies to: 4 5 (A) develop healthy, age-appropriate 6 relationships; 7 (B) develop healthy life skills, including critical thinking, problem solving, effective communication, and 8 responsible decision making about sexuality and relationships; and 9 (C) promote effective communication between 10 adolescents and their parents, legal guardians, or other family 11 12 members about sexuality and relationships; and (8) discuss information and resources relating to 13 14 sexual harassment, sexual assault, adolescent relationship abuse, 15 intimate partner violence, and sex trafficking. (d) A school district may separate students according to sex 16 17 when providing instruction under this section. (e) A school district shall make all curriculum materials 18 19 used in the district's human sexuality education available for reasonable public inspection. 20 21 (f) A student shall be excused from human sexuality education on the written request of a parent or legal guardian 22 without being subjected to any disciplinary action, academic 23 24 penalty, or other sanction imposed by the school district or the student's school. 25 26 (g) Before each school year, a school district shall provide written notice to a parent or legal guardian of each student 27

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1	enrolled in the district of the intent to provide human sexuality
2	education under this section. The notice must include:
3	(1) a summary of the basic content of the human
4	sexuality education to be provided to the student; and
5	(2) a statement of the parent's or legal guardian's
6	<u>right to:</u>
7	(A) review curriculum materials as provided by
8	Subsection (e); and
9	(B) remove the student from any part of the
10	district's human sexuality education as provided by Subsection (f).
11	SECTION 2. Sections 28.004(c) and (j), Education Code, are
12	amended to read as follows:
13	(c) The local school health advisory council's duties
14	include recommending:
15	(1) the number of hours of instruction to be provided
16	in:
17	(A) health education in kindergarten through
18	grade eight; and
19	(B) if the school district requires health
20	education for high school graduation, health education, including
21	physical health education and mental health education, in grades 9
22	through 12;
23	(2) policies, procedures, strategies, and curriculum
24	appropriate for specific grade levels designed to prevent physical
25	health concerns, including obesity, cardiovascular disease, Type 2
26	diabetes, and mental health concerns, including suicide, through
27	coordination of:

health 1 (A) education, which must address physical health concerns and mental health concerns to ensure the 2 3 integration of physical health education and mental health education; 4 5 (B) physical education and physical activity; (C) nutrition services; 6 7 (D) parental involvement; 8 (E) instruction on substance abuse prevention; 9 (F) school health services, including mental 10 health services; a comprehensive school counseling program 11 (G) under Section 33.005; 12 a safe and healthy school environment; and 13 (H) 14 (I) school employee wellness; 15 (3) policies adopted by the district regarding the human sexuality education provided under 16 Section 28.0042 [appropriate grade levels and methods of instruction for 17 human sexuality instruction]; 18 (4) 19 strategies for integrating the curriculum components specified by Subdivision (2) with the following elements 20 21 in a coordinated school health program for the district: 22 (A) school health services, including physical health services and mental health services, if provided at a campus 23 24 by the district or by a third party under a contract with the 25 district; 26 (B) a comprehensive school counseling program 27 under Section 33.005;

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1 (C) a safe and healthy school environment; and school employee wellness; 2 (D) if feasible, joint use agreements or strategies 3 (5) for collaboration between the school district and community 4 5 organizations or agencies; (6) strategies to increase 6 parental awareness 7 regarding: 8 (A) risky behaviors and early warning signs of suicide risks and behavioral health concerns, including mental 9 health disorders and substance use disorders; and 10 (B) available community programs and services 11 12 that address risky behaviors, suicide risks, and behavioral health 13 concerns; 14 (7) appropriate grade levels and curriculum for 15 instruction regarding the dangers of opioids, including instruction on: 16 17 (A) opioid addiction and abuse, including addiction to and abuse of synthetic opioids such as fentanyl; and 18 19 (B) methods of administering an opioid antagonist, as defined by Section 483.101, Health and Safety Code; 20 21 and appropriate grade levels and curriculum 2.2 (8) for 23 instruction regarding child abuse, family violence, dating 24 violence, and sex trafficking, including likely warning signs that a child may be at risk for sex trafficking, provided that the local 25 26 school health advisory council's recommendations under this subdivision do not conflict with the essential knowledge and skills 27

A school district shall make all curriculum materials (j) 2 used in the district's [human sexuality instruction or] instruction 3 relating to the prevention of child abuse, family violence, dating 4 5 violence, and sex trafficking[-] available by: (1)for curriculum materials in the public domain: 6 7 providing a copy of the curriculum materials (A) 8 by mail or e-mail to a parent of a student enrolled in the district on the parent's request; and 9 10 (B) posting the curriculum materials on the district's Internet website, if the district has an Internet 11 12 website; and for copyrighted curriculum materials, allowing a 13 (2) 14 parent of a student enrolled in the district to: 15 (A) review the curriculum materials at the student's campus at any time during regular business hours; 16 17 (B) purchase a copy of the curriculum materials from the publisher as provided by the district's purchase agreement 18 19 for the curriculum materials under Subsection [(j-1) or ](j-2); or (C) review the curriculum materials online 20 through a secure electronic account in a manner that prevents the 21 curriculum materials from being copied and that otherwise complies 22 23 with copyright law. 24 SECTION 3. Sections 28.004(e), (e-1), (e-2), (e-3), (g), (h), (i), (j-1), and (p)(2), Education Code, are repealed. 25 26 SECTION 4. This Act applies beginning with the 2025-2026 27 school year.

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1 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 2 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 3 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 4 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 5 Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
